# The Year in Review

2013 was a busy year of building projects. Now 23 years old, the main library was in need of repairs and refurbishment, and the Attica branch also needed attention. We were able to accomplish these goals thanks to a very generous bequest from the late Stella MacDonald, which the board chose to use for lasting improvements, a fitting way to honor and preserve the memory of a devoted library supporter.

The library board first worked closely with Library Design Associates of Plymouth, Michigan, to find better ways to use the building's existing space. Seemingly minor changes in shelving arrangements opened up room for additional public service desks to better serve patrons, and made it possible to increase the teen area, which was very small, crowded, and heavily used. A new information desk especially for the children's area made the youth librarian available for the first time on the public service floor, better placed to help our youngest patrons. And a new desk in the computer lab positioned the technical services librarian in just the right spot to assist computer users. The main check out desk got a facelift, repairing worn and damaged surfaces. Furnishings carefully selected for their durability were chosen, including armchairs and small tables intended to increase the available seating throughout the building. More outlets for charging electronic devices were installed, in response to patron requests. And it was amazing to see the change a few coats of paint made. The main library is now a cozy and welcoming place, with lots of spaces for patrons to read, research, use their laptops, study, or visit for awhile. The Attica branch got a children's area with its own special furniture, and some color on the walls helped make this little library warm and inviting.

New services added this year included a winter reading program for children, Free Comic Book Day, and R.E.A.D., Reading Education Assistance Dogs.

The Friends ongoing book sale space was expanded, from a small cart to two bookcases. The Friends continued their support of the library's programs and services, helping fund events for children and adults all year long.

Looking ahead, it is likely the building will continue to need repairs, as, for example, its furnaces and air conditioners reach the end of their life cycles. Other financial challenges loom, in the form of decreasing millage revenue, rising costs, and the possibility of a minimum wage increase. The board is looking into ways to cope with the changes these challenges will bring. In the meantime, we remain committed to bringing our patrons the best services we can provide, and we thank you for your support of the library.

- Patrons checked out or used over 96,000 items in 2013. Over 3,000 of those checkouts were digital items.

Other forms of revenue include, but are not limited to, the following: Penal Fines (e.g., traffic violations), State Aid, Miscellaneous Fees (e.g., copies, fax, overdue fines), Federal and Local Grants, and Private Donations. - DVDs, CDs, audiobooks, video games, digital books, magazines, newspapers, and jigsaw puzzles for checkout.
- Conference Facilities: Our meeting room can accommodate up to 30 individuals. (Free to Not-For-Profit agencies, \$10 charge for all others)
- Quiet Study Rooms: Whether studying for an exam or meeting with associates, our quiet study rooms can seat 4 to 8 individuals. (*No charge, subject to availability*)
- Business Reference Resources: Small business management materials, marketing information, professional online journals, and career resources.
- Technology Service Center: Imlay City branch has a 13-station computer lab with both high-speed cable Internet access and *Microsoft Office*. Attica branch has two computer stations with wireless internet access and *Microsoft Office*.
- Continuing Education: Free public Internet and computer applications training.
- Local History & Genealogy: Local area historical information, free access to *HeritageQuest* database, back issues of local and county newspapers, plat maps, city and state genealogical information.
- Government Information: Local ordinances, local, state and federal tax resources, contact information for local, state and national representatives, senators and congressional representatives.
